2021 ANNUAL REPORT



Our Dorchester and Roxbury community of the 70s and 80s looked vastly different than it does today. There were frequent fires, a lack of safe housing and no understanding of family homelessness. Seeing the challenges before the community, Sister Margaret Leonard and the Little Sisters of the Assumption opened the doors of their convent and shared their home with women and families who had nowhere else to go. The sisters knew that only from the safety of shelter could the women then tap the capacity within themselves to take their next step forward. Living side by side and experiencing each woman's personal journey germinated the seed that became Project Hope Boston.



Project Hope's Fitness Fundraising Campaign

Increased collaboration with the City of Boston

In 2021 Project Hope Boston increased its collaboration with the City of Boston by administering Rental Relief funds to help Boston residents who had difficulty paying their rent because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Rental Relief Fund provided up to \$15,000 in assistance for income eligible households for up to 12 months for arrears, current rent, and future rent, as well as up to \$1,500 of past due utilities. As a result of this partnership, Project Hope's eviction preventions were 365% higher than we projected that year. We were able to help 684 families avoid eviction and remain in their homes during such a challenging time.

Expanding the Family Shelter

In celebration of our 40th anniversary, we embarked on a mission to expand and renovate the shelter where the journey began. We set an ambitious goal of raising \$1,000,000 to renovate the shelter in order to serve even more families and provide much-need upgrades and accommodations for families with special needs. With an architectural plan in hand, a contractor selected, and permits finalized in 2021, the work began in early 2022. Once complete, the shelter's first floor will have four ADA accessible family bedrooms, two ADA-accessible bathrooms, a new accessible kitchenette/lounge for gatherings and children's play and many other updates and repairs to the original space.



Virtual fundraiser

Like many organizations, Project
Hope Boston could not host our
signature fundraising event and Boston
Marathon team in 2021. But that did not stop us from
mobilizing hundreds of people in support of our families.
Our Fitness for HOPE virtual fundraiser brought together
teams from among our corporate partners and individual
donors to collectively raise thousands of dollars for the
programs and services our families rely upon.

Investment in technology

While our initial shift to online programming was in response to the pandemic, we have continued to invest in technology that helps us increase efficiency, measure data and better serve program participants. Recent investments include:

- More flexible, online programming allowing more people to attend and watch "on demand" as needed
- Distribution of laptop donations to address "technology gap"
- Technical support to provide trouble-shooting with new computers, remote access, and online resources
- New best practices (Zoom, Google Classroom, etc) have enhanced our education and workforce programming and the skills of our educators and mentors
- Advanced digital data collection platforms allow us to easily receive feedback from program participants, record case notes, and capture essential data to inform our programmatic enhancements.
- Ongoing investment in recruiting and training best practices


